Raag-time: Incorporating Non-Western Musical Traditions

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What is a Raag?

- Genre within the tradition of Indian Classical Music (ICM).
 - Structured Improvisation
 - Different Raags for different times of day
 - Scales unique to that part of the world
- Instrumentation
 - Melodic instruments: Sitar, Bansuri
 - "Continuo": Tanpura, Harmonium
 - Percussion: Pakhawaj



Structure

Alaap

- Slow, improvisatory section.
- Unveils melodic material

Gat


- Typically 2 Gat sections
- More animated
- Specified and improvised material

Ending

- Preceded by optional Jhala
- Driving and excited!
