#### 100 Concertos from The American Piano Concerto Compendium

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- John Adams Century Rolls (1996); Eros Piano (1989); Grand Pianola Music/two pianos (1982). All 3: CD/YouTube = YT
- Beth Anderson Concerto (1947): There's never been a concerto like this post-minimalist example. CD Leroy Anderson Concerto in C (1953): his most ambitious concert work. CD/YT
- Daniel Asia Concerto (1994); a remarkable pastiche of colorful orchestration surrounding jazzy rhythms and dark romanticism with an internal depth, almost a brooding intensity, propelling it forward. CD/YT
- George Barati Concerto (1973): this is a concerto of highest polish and musical intelligence.
- Samuel Barber Concerto (1962). Pulitzer Prize. This is a real virtuoso concerto, with some staggeringly difficult writing. CD/YT
- Irwin Bazelon Trajectories (1985): interlay between piano and orchestra is seamless, the movement between rhythmic sections, legato, and lyrical passages keeps the listener on the edge of their seat. CD/YT
- Leonard Bernstein Symphony No. 2, "Age of Anxiety": This is the finest single movement in an American idiom and feeling that ever I have heard. CD/YT
- Marc Blitzstein Concerto (1931): This is a strong, quirky, original work by a composer of great skill. CD William Bolcom Concerto (1976): neatly crafted, essentially lyrical, entertaining, fun, and occasionally downright funny. CD
- Elliott Carter Concerto (1965): the most original and powerful work by an American composer Double Concerto (1961): nothing less than an astonishing conception. Both on CD/YT
- Aaron Copland Concerto (1926): this new concerto sounded like the early work of a man who may become a great composer! CD/YT CD/YT
- John Corigliano Concerto (1968) ranging from dissonance through jazzy modernism to tenderly romantic strains reminiscent of the Baroque, it is marked by rapid changes of tempo and quick changes from furious vigor to the utmost delicacy. CD/YT
- Henry Cowell 5 concertos, including Concerto (1929): Mr. Cowell is a musical power, a genius, and the sounds born of his spirit and fingers spring into true being, pulsing with an imperious life that is not to be doubted no matter how strange the form. CD/YT
- Richard Danielpour 5 concertos, including Metamorphosis/CD; No. 2; No.3/Zodiac/LH; No.4/Hero CD/YT; Mirrors.
- Norman Dello Joio Fantasy and Variations (1961): the most significant piano-and orchestra composition by an American composer in years; Ricercari (1946) both LP/YT.
- Emma Lou Diemer Concerto in One Movement (1991) Friedheim Orchestral Award 1992. YT
- Antal Dorati Concerto (1974): one helluva brilliant new piano concerto. YT
- John Duke Concerto, piano and strings (1938): a delightfully warm composition.
- Eric Ewazen Chamber Symphony for Piano/Ch Orch (1985): omnipresent piano, as harpsichord in Baroque orchestral music. CD/YT.
- Alan Fletcher Concerto (2017): The piece is about singing. The piano and orchestra are sometimes opposed and sometimes united, but they are always singing to each other. 1st perf. July/Aspen
- Lukas Foss No. 2 (1953): Foss crafted a work accommodating the past and the present. Arthur Rubinstein championed it, calling it 'one of the finest pieces written in our time'. CD/YT
- Philip Glass No. 1, "Tirol" (2000): cast in the poignant, elegiac style that Glass knows so well . . . the emotion of this music is as familiar as, say, love—and as endlessly fresh; No. 2, "Lewis & Clark" (2004): Commissioned by the Nebraska Lewis and Clark Bicentennial Commission in celebration of the 200th Anniversary of the explorers' journey across the American continent.; Double (piano) Concerto (2015): There's a mellow, jazzy quality at play: Imagine Gershwin as a Minimalist. All 3: CD/YT
- Morton Gould 6 concertos including the following on CD/YT: Chorale & Fugue in Jazz (1934); Dance Variations (1952); Interplay (1943); Inventions (1953): popular and contemporary mix.
- Howard Hanson Concerto (1948): music that is ruthless, jazzy, similar to Gershwin in haste. CD/YT

- Jennifer Higdon Concerto (2006): music that is immensely colorful and highly approachable. See YT. Hoiby, Lee No. 1 (1958): should find a place in the repertory CD/YT; No. 2 (1980): Hoiby writes with enormous assurance and craft CD.
- Ezra Laderman No 1 (1978: about battles and reconciliations between tonal and non-tonal YT John LaMontaine Birds of Paradise (1964); No. 1 (1958); No. 4 (1989): immediately appeals. All CD/YT Benjamin Lees No. 1 (1955): a sense of adventure is in the air; No. 2 (1966): brooding intensity, tough minded music. CD/YT. Etudes (1974), CD/YT; Variations (1975), YT.
- Lowell Liebermann No. 1 (1983), CD; No. 2 (1992): among the best works of its kind in this century CD/YT; No. 3 (2006): arresting effects abound; Paganini Variations (2000): a very remarkable piece YT.
- Peter Mennin Concerto (1958): music of expressive power and poetic distinction CD/YT John Musto No. 1 (2005); No. 2 (2006): immensely likeable, highly individual, well worth hearing . . . both exude an attractively American urban sensibility. Both on CD/YT
- Andrew Norman Split (2015): audacious, exhilarating and exhausting!
- David Ott No. 2 (1995): sonorous and bravura, attaining eloquent beauty  $YT/1^{st}$  mvt. only
- Carter Pann No. 1 (1997) Grammy nominated CD/YT; Concerto Logic (2008) YT/2<sup>nd</sup> mvt. only Stephen Paulus No.1 (2002); No. 2 (2005) both on YT
- George Perle No. 1 (1990): its heart is in its brief, eloquent slow movement, a 5½ min. piece of musical poetry CD/YT; No. 2 (1992): brisk, lucid, clean-lined, spiky, witty, sparkling CD; Concertino (1979) and Serenade No. 3 1983) on YT.
- Vincent Persichetti Concerto (1962); commended to any pianist seeking a crowd-pleasing change of pace from the other big American concertos CD/YT
- Tobias Picker Keys to the City (1983): sparkling, brash, rhythmically vital CD/YT
- Quincy Porter Concerto, 2 pianos (1953). Pulitzer Prize. "A well-bred piece of music." CD/YT
- Walter Piston Concerto, 2 pianos (1959): all clarity and light, with a jazzy finale. CD/YT
- Kevin Puts Night (2008): before long, the pianist needs more hands than nature provides. The solo writing is virtuosic. YT
- Bernard Rands Concerto (2013): subtlety of color, sophisticated compositional craft, protean interlay between soloist and ensemble, refreshingly free of formulas.
- Marga Richter Landscapes of the Mind (1976): no one has blended East and West with such imaginatively brilliant osmosis; Concerto piano and strings (1955) LP
- Wallingford Riegger Variations (1953): the variations have a quality that so few equivalent twelvetone works have. There isn't a dull moment in the ever-changing brilliant bantering. – CD/YT
- Ned Rorem No. 2 (1950): endless stretches of sensitive lyricism, brilliant orchestration, and absorbing musical thought....an absurdly neglected standard repertoire item CD; Concerto for Left Hand (1991): sensuous but lucid textures, singing melodies, swirling string figurations, lovely harmonies, and joy in manipulating sound CD/YT; Concerto 6 Mvts. (1970) CD/YT
- William Schuman Concerto (1942); spartan, biting energy, unmistakably American as the echo of wide-open prairies CD/YT
- Roger Sessions Concerto (1956): there is passion but always of a judicious, balanced sort that might be better described as thoughtful feeling or feelingful thought CD/YT
- Robert Starer No. 3 (1974): a language that is individual and impressive, pungently kaleidoscopic in its contrast of brilliance and intimacy in contemporary terms; Concerto 2 pianos (1996) CD
- William Sydeman Concerto, 4 hds (1967): The results are refreshing, fascinating and continually surprising YT
- Ben Weber Concerto (1961): flirting with serial technique ... completely traditional CD/YT
- Dan Welcher Concerto "Shiva's Drum" (1993): a first movement that was a riot of exotic color, bristling rhythms, a shimmering, introspective second movement and a dashing, pulsating finale.
- Charles Wuorinen No. 1 (1966); No. 3 (1983); No. 4 (2004) all on CD/YT
- Ellen Taaffe Zwilich Concerto (1986); consistently thoughtful, with no apparent vapidity soiling fetching musical ideas CD/YT; Millenium Fantasy (2000) CD; Peanuts Gallery (1996) CD/YT; Shadows (2011); Triple Concerto (1995) CD/YT
- Samuel Zyman Concerto (1988): ...sheer breath-taking bravura. YT

**Asch, Anna** (1933- ) A composer of 12 one-movement concertinos, Anna Asch wrote for intermediate and early advanced students. Orchestrations were created by her husband, Albert Asch. A complete description of each concertino can be found in Beres and Hahn. Some are on YouTube

**Borden, David** (1938- ) *Trudymusic*. CMP Library Edition, 1967 - 4 mins. Available from 4 libraries. Advanced high school.

Boykin, A. Helen (1904-1997) Concerto in F. AMP, published 1986. Many YouTube performances

Eckstein, Maxwell (1905-1974) Concerto for Young Americans. CFischer ©1955 - 8 mins. Available for orchestra or band

Frank, Marcel (1906-1985) *Youth Concerto in E-flat Major* - H. Elkan, ©1933 - 11 mins. 1<sup>st</sup> performance with Lansdowne (PA) Symphony; Henri Elkan, Diana Cusmina (12-yr old pianist from Riverton, NJ)

Pelz, Walter (1908-1962) Sentimental Rhapsody - JFischer, ©1938, 4-5 mins. Publisher note: This jolly piece was written at the suggestion of Guy Maier who has performed it on numerous occasions. Mr. Maier characterizes it as a miniature Rhapsody in Blue, "grateful, pianistic, and not all difficult to play." The piano part demands a dashing, buoyantly rhythmic style of performance, but it should be excellently adapted to young pianists playing with school or local orchestras

Rahbee, Dianne (1938- ) Concertino No.1, "Peasant Folk Dance," Op. 82, with chamber or string orchestra. FJH Music - 1997. CD and YouTube. Composer note: technically comparable to Haydn's D Major Concerto. Its energy and lighthearted spirit are meant to excite the imagination of the performer and the listener. The musical content introduces twentieth century vocabulary in an approachable fashion, and stretches the ear gently in new directions.


